

Why is my pottery wonky?

We've all been making pottery for the holidays, and nothing is more disappointing than having your piece come out of the kiln "wonky" or warped. Cries are heard throughout the studio: "Why did it warp?" Here are a few reasons and a couple of videos that will help you avoid future warping. **Overhandling:** Clay has memory and it remembers how it was shaped. <u>Clay Memory Video</u>. There are other reasons as well, including: the walls are too thin; rolling out clay unevenly; uneven drying and drying too fast; not keeping it flat; and the choice of clay. <u>7 Reasons your Pottery is Warping Video</u>. This is a good video, but be prepared for a 2 minute commercial in the middle about her sponsor. You can fast forward through it. *Here's to less warping in the New Year*!
