Dried Out Clay? Give It Some Love!

It's happened to all of us. Life gets busy, and by the time we get back into the studio, our clay is dry. All is not lost. There is no need to throw the clay away. Here are a couple of ways to put moisture back into your clay. If your whole block of clay is hard, there is a quick and easy way to make it pliable:

Add 1 cup of water to the bag of clay and tie it off with a rubber band. Then place the bag in a bucket of water. The pressure of the water will force the water that is in the bag into the clay. Check out this video on how to *Rehydrate a Block of Clay*. However, many of us have small balls of clay from leftover projects and we never get around to using them. Here's a video that shows another way to *Reconstitute Dry Clay*. Contact the Board for names of members who are willing to mentor you in this process.
