Helping the Butterfly Gardens

All about Shards

In a community studio, shards are supplied to help prevent glaze drips onto the kiln shelf. Ideally, shard placement covers the whole bottom of the piece and extends 1/2" beyond the edge.



Mistakes are made when members choose shards that are bloated, not level, or have spots of glaze on them. These should be discarded. Always put wax resist on the lower 1/4" of your piece, which will help keep the glaze from running off your piece of pottery. Remember to keep glaze layering to the top 1/3 of your piece. BUT sometimes glaze does run off and your piece sticks to the shard. All is not lost! A gentle tap on the table often releases it. If that doesn't work, put the piece into your freezer for an hour, then try to pry it off with a screwdriver or putty knife.
